Where did we start?


- 1999 started as Duluth Chargers Lacrosse

- 1999 Duluth Chargers began as a youth sport.
- 2015 Arrowhead Titans (Proctor/Hermantown, and included Cloquet/Esko/Carlton) broke off from the Chargers.
- 2019 season Superior broke off from the Chargers.
- 2019 was also a good time to change from Duluth Chargers and mirror our high school program and take on the Duluth YOUTH Wolfpack Lacrosse Association (DWYLax) name.

What we do for Duluth?

- Average 165 youth players/members per year
- Give opportunity to be part of a youth activity as well as a team.
- Develop youth athletes in the sport of lacrosse
- Give the opportunity to play a 'new' sport.
- We offer scholarships on an as needed basis, allowing ALL that want to play and learn.
- Host multiple out of town teams and families to the City of Duluth on weekends during the Spring months.





Historical Context

- Formerly Franklin School
 - Operated from 1889 1977
- City acquired portion of property in 1973
- Built community center in 1974
- Current sport court area held a hockey rink
- Rezoned to Park and Open Space in 2015






Connection to accessible swing from N. 5th Avenue E.

The park lacks formalized connections and accessible pathways into the park, between park amenities, and between the upper and lower areas of the park.





Community Center Building





The 930 square foot building has been permanently closed due to concerns of public safety. The small size and deteriorated condition of the building make it incompatible with modern community center needs.

Sport Court

The sport court was installed in 1998, and cracksealed and seal-coated in 2021. Underlying foundational issues call for a fully renewed court.



Playground




At 25 years old, the existing playground equipment has surpassed its recommended lifespan and is due for replacement.





PEOPLE PER SOUARE MILE - 2020 CENSUS DATA






Median Household Income

017 - 2021 AMERICAN COMMUNITY SURVEY 5-YEAR ESTIMATES




Percent of Households Earning Less Than \$10K

Plan Process

WINTER 2022

Giving Garden Project Proposal*

Health Equity Northland, in collaboration with St. Mark Giving Garden & Food Access Project, submitted a transformative giving gardenfocused project proposal for Hillside Sport Court Park.

SPRING 2023

Community Engagement

City staff presented the park plan process to the Parks and Recreation Commission, and an interactive community input session was held to better understand community needs and preferences for park improvements.

SUMMER 2022

Site Analysis Begins

In anticipation of updating existing park amenities, City staff conducted site visits to analyze the condition of various park elements, prioritize investment needs, and align those needs with available funding.

WINTER 2022 - 2023

City Review Process

The project proposal review committee determined that the extent of proposed park alterations called for a more indepth review and park planning process, requiring input from both City staff and the community at-large. City staff from a range of areas of expertise were engaged to provide their professional input on a park improvement considerations and priorities.

SUMMER 2023

Draft and Final Plan

A draft version of the park plan will be presented at the June Parks and Recreation Commission meeting, followed by a two-week public comment period. A final plan document will return to the Parks and Recreation Commission for approval in August, before going to City Council for adoption.









Park Improvement Priorities

BASED ON WEIGHTED SCORES FROM COMMUNITY INPUT SESSION




Sport Court Use Priorities

BASED ON WEIGHTED SCORES FROM COMMUNITY INPUT SESSION




Preferred Size of Open Greenspace

BASED ON VOTES FROM COMMUNITY INPUT SESSION




Preferred Size of Community Garden




Preferred Parking Area Improvements

Prioritized Park Improvements for Hillside Sport Court Park	With Limited Funding	Where Additional Funding Allows
1. Site Connectivity and Accessibility	Improve accessibility to existing park amenities	Expand connections throughout site and provide accessible pathways to all park amenities, including any new amenities
2. Community Gathering Spaces	Remove community building	Remove community building and add a pavilion and picnic area
3. Sport Court	Resurface existing sport court	Fully replace and, if possible, expand sport court
4. Playground	Replace end-of-life playground in existing location	Replace and relocate playground to western side of park and add embankment slides
5. Parking	Resurface existing parking area or convert parking area to greenspace	Formalize existing parking area or relocate parking to angled street parking
6. Trees and Vegetation	Do not remove or add any trees or vegetation	Remove and replace all ash trees and add new vegetation
	Addresses existing park elements first; Balances park system goals, community input, and maintenance needs	Preferred park improvements as shown in Conceptual Park Plan

Implementation Timeline

FALL 2023

Technical Specifications & Funding Package

City staff will develop the more technical and detailed site and landscape plans required to put the project out for bid and establish a funding package for project implementation.

SPRING - SUMMER 2024

Construction

Ideally, construction will take place during the spring and summer months of 2024.

Project Completion


Hillside Sport Court Park improvements are anticipated to be completed and celebrated in the fall of 2024.
