
RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING PROPER CITY OFFICIALS TO ACCEPT A GRANT FROM THE UNITED STATES DEPARTMENT OF JUSTICE IN THE AMOUNT OF \$38,486 AND FURTHER AUTHORIZING EXECUTION OF GRANT AGREEMENT WITH ST. LOUIS COUNTY.

CITY PROPOSAL:

RESOLVED, that the proper city officials are hereby authorized to accept a FY2013 Justice Assistance Grant Program award from the United States department of justice, bureau of justice assistance, office of justice programs, in the amount of \$38,486 to be used for state and local initiatives including the First Witness Child Abuse & Resource Center, St. Louis County mental health court, and to help fund the mounted patrol, technical assistance, equipment, supplies, contractual support, and criminal justice information systems; and further are authorized to execute any documents required to be executed to accept said grant, funds to be deposited in Fund 215-200-2300-4209-02 (Duluth police grant programs, police, 2013 JAG, direct federal grants operating), reimbursement payments to St. Louis County to be paid from Fund 215-200-2300-5447 (Duluth police grant programs, police, 2013 JAG, payment to other government agencies) and other expenses to be paid from Fund 215-200-2300-5441 (Duluth police grant programs, police, 2013 JAG, other services & charges).

FURTHER RESOLVED, that the proper city officials are hereby authorized to execute an agreement, substantially the same as that on file in the office of the city clerk as Public Document No. _____, with the St. Louis County Sheriff's Office, who is a partner of the city under this grant.

STATEMENT OF PURPOSE: The Duluth police department is the designated recipient and fiscal agent of a FY2013 justice assistance grant ("JAG") from the U.S. Department of Justice in the amount of \$38,486. The St. Louis County Sheriff's Office is a partner with the city under this grant and will provide various services. The city will reimburse First Witness Child Abuse & Resource Center and St. Louis County Mental Health Court in an amount not to exceed \$10,000 for expenses more particularly set forth in the budget attached to the grant documents. The balance of the grant award will be utilized by the Duluth police department to support the mounted patrol.

This resolution authorizes the acceptance of the grant award and approves the agreement with the St. Louis County Sheriff's Office.

**AGREEMENT REGARDING
FY2013 JUSTICE ASSISTANCE GRANT
BETWEEN ST. LOUIS COUNTY SHERIFF'S OFFICE
AND CITY OF DULUTH**

THIS AGREEMENT is made by and between the CITY OF DULUTH, a municipal corporation under the laws of the State of Minnesota, hereinafter referred to as "City", and ST. LOUIS COUNTY acting through its Sheriff's Office, a Minnesota county acting through its governing body, hereinafter referred to as "County".

WHEREAS, City is the recipient of a Justice Assistance Grant Award ("JAG") from the Bureau of Justice Assistance of the U.S. Department of Justice, pursuant to which the City is to act as fiscal agent for funds to be used to enhance local criminal justice and law enforcement efforts as are further described herein; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to the terms of said Grant, County is to use said funds for state and local initiatives including the First Witness Child Abuse & Resource Center, St. Louis County Mental Health Court, technical assistance, training, personnel, equipment, supplies, contractual support, and criminal justice information systems for criminal justice, for which it will be entitled to reimbursement under the terms of the Grant; and

WHEREAS, the parties hereto have deemed it desirable to enter into an agreement memorializing the County's rights and responsibilities in the implementation of said Grant.

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the mutual covenants and conditions hereinafter contained, the parties hereto agree as follows:

ARTICLE I

Scope of Professional Services

County agrees to allocate funds that will be used to provide equipment and services in support of state and local initiatives including the First Witness Child Abuse & Resource Center, St. Louis County Mental Health Court, technical assistance, training, personnel, equipment, supplies, contractual support, and criminal justice information systems for criminal justice, as follows:

- \$5,000 to First Witness Child Abuse & Resource Center
- \$5,000 to St. Louis County Mental Health Court

In addition to the above, \$28,486 will be used by the Duluth Police Department to support the Mounted Patrol. Grant funds are to be deposited into Fund 215-200-2300-4209-02 (Duluth Police Grant Programs, Police, 2013 JAG, Direct Federal Grants

Operating). In the event of any conflict between the terms of the Budget and this Agreement, the terms and conditions of the Budget shall be deemed to be controlling.

ARTICLE II

Reimbursement for Expenses

County shall be reimbursed for the cost of acquiring equipment and providing support to the programs as described in the County portion of Article I in an amount of not to exceed Ten Thousand Dollars and 00/100 (\$10,000.00). Upon acquisition of the equipment and services, and expenditure of funds in support of the programs as provided for in Article I, and presentation to City of documentation establishing the cost to County thereof, City shall promptly reimburse County for said costs. Requests for reimbursement shall be made no more frequently than monthly and shall be accompanied by such documentation as City shall reasonably request. Upon receipt of said request and the appropriate documentation, City shall promptly reimburse County for eligible costs up to the amount set forth above. All reimbursement payments to County pursuant to this Agreement shall be paid from Fund 215-200-2300-5447 (Duluth Police Grant Programs, Police, 2013 JAG, Payment to Other Government Agencies) and other expenses shall be paid from Fund 215-200-2300-5441 (Duluth Police Grant Programs, Police, 2013 JAG, Other Services & Charges).

ARTICLE III

Assignability

County shall not in any way assign or transfer any of its rights or interests under this Agreement in any way whatsoever.

ARTICLE IV

Term

The Term of this Agreement shall run concurrently with the Project Period set forth in the Grant Award and shall run through September 30, 2016.

ARTICLE V

Termination of Services

Either party may, by giving written notice at least thirty (30) days prior to the effective date thereof, terminate this Agreement in whole or in part without cause. County shall be reimbursed for services performed and expenses incurred prior to the date of termination. Provided, however, that City may terminate this Agreement upon notification from the U.S. Department of Justice that grant funding to fund City's obligations hereunder has been terminated; such termination shall be effective upon the County receiving notice thereof.

ARTICLE VI

Standard of Performance

County agrees that all services to be provided to City pursuant to this Agreement shall be in accordance with the generally accepted standards of the profession for provision of services of this type.

ARTICLE VII

Records and Inspections

A. Establishment and Maintenance of Records

Records shall be maintained by County in accordance with requirements prescribed by City and with respect to all matters covered by this Agreement. Such records shall be maintained for a period of six (6) years after receipt of final payment under this Project.

B. Documentation of Costs

County will ensure that all costs shall be supported by properly executed payrolls, time records, invoices, contracts, vouchers or other official documentation evidencing in proper detail the nature and propriety of the charges. All checks, payrolls, invoices, contracts, vouchers, orders or other accounting documents pertaining in whole or in part to this Agreement shall be clearly identified and readily accessible.

C. Reports and Information

County shall be responsible for furnishing to City records, data and information as City may require pertaining to matters covered by this Agreement.

D. Audits and Inspections

County shall ensure that at any time during normal business hours and as often as County may deem necessary, there shall be made available to City for examination, all of its records with respect to all matters covered by this Agreement. County will also permit City, State and Federal to audit, examine and make excerpts or transcripts from such records, and to make audits of all contracts, invoices, materials, payrolls, records of personnel, conditions of employment, and other data relating to all matters covered by this Agreement.

E. Information

All reports, data, information, documentation and material given or prepared by the County pursuant to this Agreement will be public except as provided for in applicable Federal or state laws, rules, regulations or orders.

ARTICLE VIII

Independent Contractor

It is agreed that nothing herein contained is intended or shall be construed in any manner as creating or establishing a relationship of co-partners between the parties hereto or of constituting either party as an agent, representative or employee of the other for any purpose or in any manner whatsoever. Neither party nor any officers or

employees thereof shall be considered an employee of the other party, and any and all claims that may or might arise under the Workers' Compensation Act of the State of Minnesota on behalf of either party and their employees while so engaged and any and all claims whatsoever on behalf of either party arising out of employment or alleged employment, including without limitation, claims of discrimination against either party, its officers, agents, contractors or employees shall in no way be the responsibility of the other party. Neither party nor their officers, agents, contractors and employees shall be entitled to any compensation or rights or benefits of any hospital care, sick leave and vacation pay, Workers' Compensation, Unemployment Insurance, disability pay or severance pay from the other party.

ARTICLE IX

Liability

A. As Between the Parties

Each party hereto agrees that it will be solely liable for any liability arising out of any acts or omissions of itself or its officers, agents, servants, employees or subcontractors in the performance of its respective obligations under this Agreement.

B. Limitation of Liability

Nothing herein shall be deemed to create any liability on behalf of either party not otherwise existing as to such party under the provisions of Minnesota Statutes Chapter 466 or to extend the amount of liability of either party to amounts in excess of that specified in said Chapter.

C. Third Party Liability

Nothing herein shall be deemed to create any liability to any third party not otherwise existing under applicable law.

ARTICLE X

Civil Rights Assurances

County and its officers, agents, servants and employees as part of the consideration under this Agreement, does hereby covenant and agree that:

- A. No person on the grounds of race, color, creed, religion, national origin, ancestry, age, sex, marital status, status with respect to public assistance, sexual orientation and/or disability shall be excluded from any participation in, denied any benefits of or otherwise subjected to discrimination with regard to the work to be done pursuant to this Agreement.
- B. That all activities to be conducted pursuant to this Agreement shall be conducted in accordance with the Minnesota Human Rights Act of 1974, as amended (Chapter 363), Title 7 of the U.S. Code and any regulations and executive orders which may be affected with regard thereto.

ARTICLE XI

Rules and Regulations

Both parties agree to observe and comply with all laws, ordinances, rules and regulations of the United States of America, the State of Minnesota and County and the City and their respective agencies which are applicable to their activities under this Agreement.

ARTICLE XII

Notices

Notice to County or City provided for herein shall be sufficient if sent by the regular United States mail, postage prepaid, addressed to the parties at the addresses hereinafter set forth or to such other respective persons or addresses as the parties may designate to each other in writing from time to time:

ARTICLE XIII

Waiver

Any waiver by either party of any provision of this Agreement shall not imply a subsequent waiver of that or any other provision.

ARTICLE XIV

Applicable Law

This Agreement, together with all of its paragraphs, terms and provisions is made in the State of Minnesota and shall be construed and interpreted in accordance with the laws of the State of Minnesota.

ARTICLE XV

Severability

In the event any provision herein shall be deemed invalid or unenforceable, the remaining provisions shall continue in full force and effect and shall be binding upon the parties to this Agreement.

ARTICLE XVI

Entire Agreement

It is understood and agreed that the entire agreement of the parties is contained herein and that this Agreement supersedes all oral agreements and negotiations between the parties relating to the subject matter hereof. Any amendment to this Agreement shall be in writing and shall be executed by the same parties who executed the original agreement or their successors in office.

1. The recipient agrees to comply with the financial and administrative requirements set forth in the current edition of the Office of Justice Programs (OJP) Financial Guide.

13. The recipient understands and agrees that award funds may not be used to discriminate against or denigrate the religious or moral beliefs of students who participate in programs for which financial assistance is provided from those funds, or of the parents or legal guardians of such students.
14. The recipient understands and agrees that - (a) No award funds may be used to maintain or establish a computer network unless such network blocks the viewing, downloading, and exchanging of pornography, and (b) Nothing in subsection (a) limits the use of funds necessary for any Federal, State, tribal, or local law enforcement agency or any other entity carrying out criminal investigations, prosecution, or adjudication activities.
15. The recipient agrees to comply with OJP grant monitoring guidelines, protocols, and procedures, and to cooperate with BJA and OCFO on all grant monitoring requests, including requests related to desk reviews, enhanced programmatic desk reviews, and/or site visits. The recipient agrees to provide to BJA and OCFO all documentation necessary to complete monitoring tasks, including documentation related to any subawards made under this award. Further, the recipient agrees to abide by reasonable deadlines set by BJA and OCFO for providing the requested documents. Failure to cooperate with BJA's/OCFO's grant monitoring activities may result in sanctions affecting the recipient's DOJ awards, including, but not limited to: withholdings and/or other restrictions on the recipient's access to grant funds; referral to the Office of the Inspector General for audit review; designation of the recipient as a DOJ High Risk grantee; or termination of an award(s).



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SPECIAL CONDITIONS

16. The recipient agrees to comply with applicable requirements to report first-tier subawards of \$25,000 or more and, in certain circumstances, to report the names and total compensation of the five most highly compensated executives of the recipient and first-tier subrecipients of award funds. Such data will be submitted to the FFATA Subaward Reporting System (FSRS). The details of recipient obligations, which derive from the Federal Funding Accountability and Transparency Act of 2006 (FFATA), are posted on the Office of Justice Programs web site at <http://www.ojp.gov/funding/ffata.htm> (Award condition: Reporting Subawards and Executive Compensation), and are incorporated by reference here. This condition, and its reporting requirement, does not apply to grant awards made to an individual who received the award as a natural person (i.e., unrelated to any business or non-profit organization that he or she may own or operate in his or her name).
17. The recipient agrees that all income generated as a direct result of this award shall be deemed program income. All program income earned must be accounted for and used for the purposes of funds provided under this award, including such use being consistent with the conditions of the award, the effective edition of the OJP Financial Guide and, as applicable, either (1) 28 C.F.R. Part 66 or (2) 28 C.F.R Part 70 and 2 C.F.R. Part 215 (OMB Circular A-110). Further, the use of program income must be reported on the quarterly Federal Financial Report, SF 425.
18. To avoid duplicating existing networks or IT systems in any initiatives funded by BJA for law enforcement information sharing systems which involve interstate connectivity between jurisdictions, such systems shall employ, to the extent possible, existing networks as the communication backbone to achieve interstate connectivity, unless the grantee can demonstrate to the satisfaction of BJA that this requirement would not be cost effective or would impair the functionality of an existing or proposed IT system.
19. In order to promote information sharing and enable interoperability among disparate systems across the justice and public safety community, OJP requires the grantee to comply with DOJ's Global Justice Information Sharing Initiative (DOJ's Global) guidelines and recommendations for this particular grant. Grantee shall conform to the Global Standards Package (GSP) and all constituent elements, where applicable, as described at: http://www.it.ojp.gov/gsp_grantcondition. Grantee shall document planned approaches to information sharing and describe compliance to the GSP and appropriate privacy policy that protects shared information, or provide detailed justification for why an alternative approach is recommended.



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SPECIAL CONDITIONS

20. The grantee agrees to assist BJA in complying with the National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA), the National Historic Preservation Act, and other related federal environmental impact analyses requirements in the use of these grant funds, either directly by the grantee or by a subgrantee. Accordingly, the grantee agrees to first determine if any of the following activities will be funded by the grant, prior to obligating funds for any of these purposes. If it is determined that any of the following activities will be funded by the grant, the grantee agrees to contact BJA.

The grantee understands that this special condition applies to its following new activities whether or not they are being specifically funded with these grant funds. That is, as long as the activity is being conducted by the grantee, a subgrantee, or any third party and the activity needs to be undertaken in order to use these grant funds, this special condition must first be met. The activities covered by this special condition are:

- a. New construction;
- b. Minor renovation or remodeling of a property located in an environmentally or historically sensitive area, including properties located within a 100-year flood plain, a wetland, or habitat for endangered species, or a property listed on or eligible for listing on the National Register of Historic Places;
- c. A renovation, lease, or any proposed use of a building or facility that will either (a) result in a change in its basic prior use or (b) significantly change its size;
- d. Implementation of a new program involving the use of chemicals other than chemicals that are (a) purchased as an incidental component of a funded activity and (b) traditionally used, for example, in office, household, recreational, or education environments; and
- e. Implementation of a program relating to clandestine methamphetamine laboratory operations, including the identification, seizure, or closure of clandestine methamphetamine laboratories.

The grantee understands and agrees that complying with NEPA may require the preparation of an Environmental Assessment and/or an Environmental Impact Statement, as directed by BJA. The grantee further understands and agrees to the requirements for implementation of a Mitigation Plan, as detailed at <http://www.ojp.usdoj.gov/BJA/resource/nepa.html>, for programs relating to methamphetamine laboratory operations.

Application of This Special Condition to Grantee's Existing Programs or Activities: For any of the grantee's or its subgrantees' existing programs or activities that will be funded by these grant funds, the grantee, upon specific request from BJA, agrees to cooperate with BJA in any preparation by BJA of a national or program environmental assessment of that funded program or activity.

21. The recipient is required to establish a trust fund account. (The trust fund may or may not be an interest-bearing account.) The fund, including any interest, may not be used to pay debts or expenses incurred by other activities beyond the scope of the Edward Byrne Memorial Justice Assistance Grant Program (JAG). The recipient also agrees to obligate and expend the grant funds in the trust fund (including any interest earned) during the period of the grant. Grant funds (including any interest earned) not expended by the end of the grant period must be returned to the Bureau of Justice Assistance no later than 90 days after the end of the grant period, along with the final submission of the Federal Financial Report (SF-425).
22. JAG funds may be used to purchase bulletproof vests for an agency, but may not be used as the 50% match for purposes of the Bulletproof Vest Partnership (BVP) program.
23. The recipient agrees to submit a signed certification that that all law enforcement agencies receiving vests purchased with JAG funds have a written "mandatory wear" policy in effect. Fiscal agents and state agencies must keep signed certifications on file for any subrecipients planning to utilize JAG funds for ballistic-resistant and stab-resistant body armor purchases. This policy must be in place for at least all uniformed officers before any FY 2013 funding can be used by the agency for vests. There are no requirements regarding the nature of the policy other than it being a mandatory wear policy for all uniformed officers while on duty.



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24. Ballistic-resistant and stab-resistant body armor purchased with JAG funds may be purchased at any threat level, make or model, from any distributor or manufacturer, as long as the vests have been tested and found to comply with applicable National Institute of Justice ballistic or stab standards and are listed on the NIJ Compliant Body Armor Model List (<http://nij.gov>). In addition, ballistic-resistant and stab-resistant body armor purchased must be American-made. 25. The recipient agrees that any information technology system funded or supported by OJP funds will comply with 28 C.F.R. Part 23, Criminal Intelligence Systems Operating Policies, if OJP determines this regulation to be applicable. Should OJP determine 28 C.F.R. Part 23 to be applicable, OJP may, at its discretion, perform audits of the system, as per the regulation. Should any violation of 28 C.F.R. Part 23 occur, the recipient may be fined as per 42 U.S.C. 3789g(c)-(d). Recipient may not satisfy such a fine with federal funds.
26. The recipient agrees to ensure that the State Information Technology Point of Contact receives written notification regarding any information technology project funded by this grant during the obligation and expenditure period. This is to facilitate communication among local and state governmental entities regarding various information technology projects being conducted with these grant funds. In addition, the recipient agrees to maintain an administrative file documenting the meeting of this requirement. 27. The grantee agrees to comply with the applicable requirements of 28 C.F.R.
