Twenty years ago I got a job teaching at UW-Superior. My wife and I moved to Duluth and bought a home in the city's Second Council District, just half a block from the current site of the Chester Creek Café. When, after seventeen years, we decided to look for a new house, we couldn't bear to leave the neighborhood, so we moved four blocks straight down the hill to 4th Street. I've lived in Duluth's 2nd Council District longer than any other place in my life. It is my home, and it is where I raised my daughter.

I never actually set foot in Minnesota until I came here for my job interview. Duluth, however, has truly become my home. Maybe it is the weather or maybe it is the lake, but it is absolutely true that Duluth retains a strong sense of community that has been lost in most other places. Certainly, we have our challenges—limited job opportunities, aging city infrastructure and housing stock, difficult fiscal issues. But we also have something very special here. And in recent years, we have begun to have some real success building upon the city's unique qualities to address our economic and fiscal challenges.

I am applying for a position on the city council because I care deeply about this city and believe that I have a set of experiences and assets that would allow me to work productively with the council, the administration, and the public to address our pressing issues and to move Duluth forward. I am interested in the *job* far more than I am interested in the position. It is something that I have thought about doing for a long time. Now that my daughter is older (she just got her drivers' license!), it is something that I can actually do without neglecting either my obligation as a parent or my obligations to my day job.

I would bring the following assets to the council:

- Knowledge of city issues—As long as I have lived here, I have followed city issues very closely and have personally worked on a number important and (in some cases) controversial issues. I would be able to get up to speed on the issues facing the council quite quickly.
- Understanding of the political process—I understand that you don't really know what it is like to be a councilor until you are actually in the position. My long involvement in the political process in Duluth, though, including a term on City Charter Commission and membership on Mayor Doty's Bayfront Task Force (the citizen's committee that helped bring about the current Bayfront Park) has given me significant insight into the workings of city government. This would allow me to quickly step into the role of councilor.
- Strong collaborative skills—I genuinely enjoy working with others to achieve tangible goals (something I first learned as a teenager playing in rock'n'roll bands). In my work at UW-Superior I have sought out opportunities to work on campus-

wide issues. I have served many years on the campus strategic planning and budget committee. I have also served as chair of the UW-Superior Faculty Senate, the body that has primary responsibility for determining curriculum and academic policy at the campus. In these roles, I have worked with individuals who bring a variety of perspectives to identify and move forward on issues of common concern. I have also learned how to work through inevitable disagreements and conflicts (including conflicts with administration, in some cases) without allowing disputes to become personal and without severing the ongoing relationships that are required for the campus to thrive and prosper.

- A fundamental respect for the variety of people's views and life experiences—One of the things I most enjoy about working at UW-Superior is the diversity of our students' life experiences. We have students of all ages, economic and family backgrounds, and walks of life. Our students include single parents, military veterans, retirees, kids straight out of high school, and everything in between. Twenty years experience working with such a wide range of people would serve me well in the role of councilor. The job of councilor is to represent all those who live in the district and, in fact, all those who live in Duluth. While there will inevitably be disagreements, it would be my job to listen, understand, and consider the viewpoints of all, including those who have had life experiences that I have not shared and that I need to learn from. This is something I have done every day for twenty years in my job, and it is something I would look forward to doing as a councilor.

It is with the greatest respect for the responsibility in front of you, that I ask for your consideration for the position of Second District Duluth City Councilor.
