Chair Sterner calls meeting to order at 5:30pm

2. <u>Approval of Meeting Summary:</u> *April 13, 2022 Meeting*

 \rightarrow striking from the agenda; summary was approved at May meeting

- 3. PUBLIC HEARING for 2021 and CV Consolidated Annual Performance and Evaluation (CAPER)
 - a. Overview of 2021 and CV CAPER document and performance report (Suzanne Kelley presents this info from performance chart)
 - b. Questions for Sub-recipients
 - c. Public Hearing (Each speaker has up to 3 minutes to speak)
 - 1.Kate Bradley (Duluth HRA)
 - Reads a statement from ED of HRA re. Coordinated Entry System; Duluth Coordinated Entry System processed 3876 people.
 - TBRA (HOME) supports 13-20 families in Duluth every year; lets them build good rental history before transferring to Section 8 program (served 15 families in 2021, five of whom have moved into permanent housing)
 - HRA is dealing with decreased access to affordable units county-wide
 - Chair Sterner asks what is happening with the end of eviction moratorium; HRA is very concerned about eviction given the amount that renters o

2. Jodi from Eco3

 Pandemic has caused a shift in the scope of work; focus is on fuel oil conversion and costs have nearly doubled over the course of the pandemic





- Eco3 has been working on the broadband issue and converting an existing space in Lincoln Park for workforce development
- Has been working with Duluth Aging Support towards housing solutions and partnering with the Duluth Age Friendly Initiative; will be sponsoring an event at Harvest Fest where participants can "design" their ideal 400-800sq ft living space—the size of an ADU.
- 3. Jake Morgan (Duluth HRA)
 - Warming Center: opened in 2/22 and has served 554 non-duplicate persons (hoping to open 11/1-3/31 each year) – 10 year commitment (report from Jill Keppers)
 - Eviction Prevention During a Pandemic: 26 public housing residents helped ; fewer than expected because people didn't apply and / or because they didn't have a COVID-19 related reason for not paying rent
 - Rental rehab: completed 27, 23 still in progress; delays because of supply chain issues and construction delays; 20 projects in the ; moving forward the HRA has a construction training program in partnership with CAD—sold the first house and two more will be sold soon, have also trained many people through the program
- 4. Colleen Kelly (CCHC) 5 contracts
 - Two contracts were ESG
 - Deferred maintenance during COVID; huge increase in damage to property during the course of the pandemic (attributed to mental health challenges during pandemic and longer tenant stays)
 - Passed all inspections despite these challenges
 - Housing Wait List: 6 families in X units that overstayed a combined 42 months!
 - CDBG for transitional housing & permanent supportive housing (32 total units)
 - Service team had to work very hard to keep up with challenges tenants faced because of the pandemic
 - CCHC went through a transition moving property management in-house
 - Purchased laptops for staff; purchase laptops & chromebooks for student program and worked with ISD 709 for training
- 5. Jordan Johnson (LifeHouse)
 - Futures Program: did really well, worked closely with CAD & SOAR to help young people launch their own careers; education program
 - Loft Program (emergency shelter): helped 25 youth, noticed that young people are staying in shelter longer—19 did transition out to safe nonhomeless
 - Youth Center: 651 youth were helped.





- Neighborhood Youth Services: in the process of transitioning out but helped to stabilize the program after taking it over from Woodland Hills
- 6. Jason Beckman (SOAR)
 - Identified two specific trainings: (1) IT support training, (2) Auto Tech training program (partnership with Lake Superior College and Lakestar Ford) → starting at the end of August; 4 spots filled but have capacity for 10
 - Challenge: with more and more jobs available, fewer people come in looking for careers and people who do come are staying longer
 - 56 intakes, 10 are ready to go to class because the other 46 are experiencing other barriers to employment and stability (access to driver's license & vehicle)
 - Self-reporting of mental health challenges is usually ~30%, that rate has been 60% over the past year.
- 7. Jeff Corey (One Roof Community Housing)
 - CLT → finished those goals and received ~200+ applications and were able to help about 25 people buy homes – crazy high demand
 - Home Rehab program → playing catch up because of supply chain issues, construction delays, and pandemic related nervousness over working in someone else's home
 - TLC → hit its goals and what doesn't show up is all the evictions that were prevented when Eviction Moratorium expired in November/December 2021
- Decker Dwellings → 2020 project but finally completed in 2022 8. John Cole (CHUM)
 - Provided shelter for 1340 individuals → reflects increase demand on shelter system (COVID required some creativity around how to keep people safe)
 - Funding helped to create additional toilet stalls, improved sanitation, and upgrading kitchen
 - Level of drug abuse is worse than before; more and more people with disabilities; mental illness continues to present new challenges
 - Seeing an escalation of violence, drug use, drug sales, self-harm and human trafficking at the Warm Shelter
 - Created CHUM To-Go: food delivery service delivered food to 360 people
 - Funds went towards expanding shelter space (purchasing former motel)
 - Street Outreach / Stepping on Up (5 year plan to address homeless) → in this year CHUM will add two additional outreach workers; currently in





Phase 1—trying to identify safe places for people to live in vehicles, trying to identify safe spaces for people to live in tents

 - 9. Leanne & Darryl (AICHO)
 - Food Distribution & Indigenous Food Market
 - 10. Kevin Beichler (MACV)
 - Exceeded goal for outreach (ESG)
 - Exceeded goal for CDBG
 - CV funding helped them reach
 - Never shut doors during the pandemic; housed 22 of 25 vets from the CE list during the pandemic
 - 11. Brittney Robb (Safe Haven)
 - Continue to serve record numbers of people over the past two years
 - COVID presented the opportunity to partner with the City on shelter expansion project → construction should wrap up by end of summer
