Initiative Funding: The "Half-and-Half" Tourism Tax

- The Half-and-Half tax refers to two existing tourism taxes:
 - A 0.5% increment in Duluth's food and beverage tax
 - A 0.5% increment in Duluth's lodging tax
- Per state law, food and beverage taxes and lodging taxes must meaningfully support tourism.
- Current tax authorized in 2014 to fund \$18 million in improvements to tourism-supporting public outdoor recreation facilities in western Duluth.
- How Half-and-Half project financing works:
 - The City borrows to pay for authorized tourism supporting improvements
 - Annual Half-and-Half tax revenues are used to make debt payments

Additional Council Authorizations Required

Legal Requirements

- Resolution accepting the new state law
- Ordinance authorizing continuation of the tax for a new purpose

Practical Requirement

Resolution of intent charting the direction of the initiative

Future Authorizations

- Approval of bond sales to finance the initiative
- Approval of contracts for planning, design, and/or construction for each project
- Approval of plans for athletic venues that lack them





Parks Commission, Community, and Stakeholder Engagement

- Prior to phased work: Hold stakeholder meetings and Q&A sessions
- Phase 1: Community engagement previously completed as part of adopted plan processes
- Phase 2: Conduct standard park planning process and stakeholder engagement for venue locations that do not have a plan in place
- Phase 3: Conduct community planning process with Mayoral Indoor Sports Venue Task Force oversight
- **Phase 4:** Conduct standard park planning process and stakeholder engagement for venue locations that do not have a plan in place

Project Selection: The Sports Tourism Support Test

Does an athletic venue currently host – or could an improved venue in the future host – athletic competitions, activities, and events that will regularly attract numerous participants from outside the Duluth region?

- Fryberger Arena
- Arlington Sports Complex

Project Sequencing Determinants

- 1. Readiness for construction Is the project fully planned, designed, and funded and has construction begun?
- 2. Urgency of deferred maintenance issues
- 3. Importance of facility for youth sports and the community as a whole
- 4. The necessity for major fundraising and grant seeking





Investment Guidelines

- 1. Sustain and increase sports tourism
- 2. Address deferred maintenance
- Reduce routine maintenance burdens
- 4. Maximize multiple use
- 5. Invest equitably across west, central, and east Duluth
- 6. Lower barriers to athletic participation
- 7. Decrease City carbon emissions

- 2027 2029, \$8M
- Indoor sports venue

Indoor Sports Venue

- New indoor athletic venue(s) considerations:
 - Replace Fryberger Arena with new indoor rink
 - Indoor multi-purpose sport court
 - Indoor artificial turf field
- Additional venue(s) to be determined
 - Site, design, budget, public/private partnership model
- To be guided by Mayoral Indoor Sports Venue Task Force
- Final project plan proposed as top City priority for 2026 bonding session



Phase IV

- 2030 2034, \$9 M
- Outdoor Sports Venue(s) (TBD)

Outdoor Sports Venues

- Specific projects to be determined pending further public engagement
- Performance of tourism tax funds will inform when Phase IV may proceed
