AMAZING FALL MIGRATION!! 200,000-300,000 birds counted each fall!

History of Hawk Ridge Nature Reserve (Site)



 Once known as a place where birds were shot for target practice 1937 – members of Duluth Bird Club gathered "bushel baskets of dead hawks" •Birds of prey (Raptors), such as hawks, falcons, eagles, owls weren't protected by early laws.



Early years and pioneers of Hawk Ridge Nature Reserve

1972: Hawk Ridge Nature Reserve established with trust agreement between City and Duluth Audubon. Raptor count & banding research started.

History of Hawk Ridge Bird Observatory (Organization):

2003-04: The Hawk Ridge Bird Observatory formed as new nonprofit and new management entity for HRNR. HRNR designated as the first Important Bird Area in MN. Education programs and visitor services expand.

To protect birds of prey and other migratory birds in the Western Lake Superior Region through research, education, and stewardship

Planning Process

2020 – HRBO met with City of Duluth Directors (Parks & Rec and Property & Facilities) to share initial planning ideas for facilities improvements 2020 - HRBO begins work with SAS+ Associates on facilities planning and design 2021 – HRBO held focus group meetings to gather 2021 – Grant funding awarded for final planning work 2022 – Public open house held for comment

Plan and Design Goals

- 1) Accessible education areas and facilities
- 2) Improved visitor safety with roadway enhancements
- 3) Additional education areas and facilities for increased capacity, education program opportunities for both guided and self-guided visitors, and program income.





Hawk Ridge Bird Observatory (HRBO) is a 501(c)(3) nonprofit charitable organization. It was incorporated in 2004 as a successor to a committee of Duluth Audubon Society. Hawk Ridge Bird Observatory manages the 365-acre natural area, called Hawk Ridge Nature Reserve (HRNR), under a trust agreement with the City of Duluth, MN.



HAWK RIDCE BIRD OBSERVATORY is known as one of the major sites for raptor migration observationvisitors come from all over the world every fall season to participate. Additionally, the Hawk Ridge Nature Reserve is a hiking and recreation destination for Duluth citizens and visitors on a year-round basis. Due to this ever-growing popularity, HRBO has identified several needs and improvements that will serve to create a safer and more accomodating experience for guests of all abilities.

The mission of Hawk Ridge Bird Observatory is to protect birds of prey and other migratory birds in the Western Lake Superior Region through research, education, and stewardship. The primary goals of HRBO are to:

- Study one of the greatest migrations of birds of prey in North America
- RESEARCH THE DISTRIBUTION, ABUNDANCE AND MIGRATORY PATHWAYS OF BIRDS IN THE WESTERN GREAT LAKES
- EDUCATE PEOPLE ABOUT BIRD CONSERVATION
- Serve as stewards of the Hawk Ridge Nature Reserve, the first designated Important Bird Area within Minnesota

UPGRADE #1: IMPROVED ACCESSIBILITY & SAFETY

A large portion of the 2020 planning efforts focus on making more aspects of the Hawk Ridge Bird Observatory accessible to all visitors. Utilizing and expanding on existing trails, the proposed plan will provide a threequarter of a mile accessible loop with interpretive signage, group learning areas, and feeding stations. Improved drop-offareasandpermanentaccessible restroom facilities will also be added.



UPGRADE #2: ENHANCED VISITOR VIEWING & GATHERING SPACE



With the thousands of visitors that come to Hawk Ridge for the grand view, outdoor recreation, and bird migration, an expanded overlook area adjacent to East Skyline Parkway would provide a safe gathering space off the road for large groups, staging area for visitors and students, and an amphitheater-style seating space for magnificent views. A new picnic shelter will provide additional accessible gathering and seating space.

UPGRADE #3: INCREASED EDUCATIONAL FACILITIES

HRBO provides educational programming for schools, private groups, and the general public. As interest in these programs has increased, there is a need for additional and larger outdoor educational learning spaces. Currently, there is only one education program area at Hawk Ridge. It has outgrown its capacity, function, and is in need of repair. A large outdoor amphitheater is proposed for the area north of the current viewing platform. Adjacent to this space will be a new educational playscape for children of all ages to enjoy.
