

# **DULUTH FLAG PROJECT SURVEY SUMMARY**

200 Total survey responses were collected between the dates of 01/30 and 04/12. The survey had 6 questions in total, some were multiple choice and some were open response with a character limit. The way that the open response questions are summarized in this packet is first with a long summary list that includes all responses and with a corresponding word cloud which is used to indicate word reoccurrence through variations in text size. Each question is labeled Q1, Q2, etc. and has the survey question quoted at the top.







#### **DULUTH FLAG PROJECT DESIGN ENTRY SUMMARY**

195 total flag entries were collected between 01/30 and 04/12. The contact information from each designer has been omitted but a design description/meaning can be seen underneath each entry. A red number to the right of each flag design will be used to identify the submission. Participants were limited to five designs per person. If multiple flag designs were submitted from one designer, the numbering of the flags will also include letters. For example, five submitted designs from one designer would look like 1a, 1b, 1c, 1d, 1e.

Quality of flag entry will differ because both digital and physical formatting was accepted. If the Committee finds that a hand-drawn entry should be part of the final flag selection, digitization would occur before public voting in May/June in order to better promote equality and fairness during this process.



The Golden Ratio was used to balance the area of the triangle with the remaining area of the flag.




This flag combines a deep blue with a rich green to represent the ever-present nature in Duluth. Lake Superior juts into the flag from the right side. When viewed as a map, the swallowtail point represents the location of Duluth. The triangle also represents a sail, which is a nod to the nautical influence in this area. The left side of the flag shows a river running near the city. This flag has two perspectives. When rotating the orientation of the flag 90 degrees to the right, you see the hills of Duluth with our wonderful skyline. From that perspective, Lake Superior can be found at the foot of the hills. The three hills represent Thompson Hill, Enger Hill and Hawk Ridge. Again, from that perspective, the shape of the lake also forms a teepee, which is a nod to the Native American heritage of this area. The Golden Ratio was used to balance the area of the swallowtail with the remaining area of the flag.



Blue is the waves of Lake Superior, white is the white caps, green is the City of Duluth that sits on the hill.




The blue is a river and waves from Lake Superior. Yellow is sand from Brighton Beach. Green is the grass and the hills of Duluth.



The hawk stands for the Native Americans who live here. The star is the North Star. The white is for the waves of Lake Superior.




- ☐ The lift bridge, gateway to the Duluth harbor, is the symbol of Duluth as the head of shipping on the Great Lakes.

- □ The flag is symmetrical to work as a symbol for the City in a variety of situations without ever appearing backwards or upside down. It would also work as a banner.






The flag borrows from the Nordic designs, invoking the Scandinavian heritage of many of our residents. The green represents the lush forests and abundant green spaces in our city. The iron red calls to mind the red lakers and represents Duluth's history as a shipping hub. The red is set into blue, calling to mind the rich blues of Lake Superior. Finally, the arrowhead, stone grey to represent the hills and cliffs of the town, while the shape symbolizes both Duluth's status as the gateway to the arrowhead region, as well as the history of our local indigenous residents.



Represents physical and symbolic place and sense of motion. The object is both a sailboat and representation of a first nation shelter.







The blue represents water: Lake Superior, the St. Louis River, the Lester River, creeks and ponds. The brownish-black represents rock: cliffs, boulders, outcrops, and stones. The silver chain represents Duluth neighborhoods linked together creating a strong sense of community. The color silver represents clearly envisioning our community of the whole and the metal silver although strong, can be molded and worked with to continually strive for a community of the whole. The brownish-black, blue and silver chain are diagonal because Duluth is situated diagonally along Lake Superior and the St. Louis River when looking at a map.




