Winter/Spring 2018– City determine additional work scope with newly secured grant funding







ASSESSMENT OF ADDITIONAL FUNDING

- In July 2017, the U.S. Department of the Interior and the National Park Service announced that \$750,000 was awarded to Minnesota through the Outdoor Recreation Legacy Partnership (ORLP) program and that the City of Duluth would receive these funds for Lincoln Park Restoration.
- The original project components to be funded by the NPS grant included: (1) Picnic Shelters (2) WPA Pavilion Restoration (3) Trail & Pedestrian Bridges (4) Boardwalk & Overlook (5) Playground.
- LHB (local design and engineering firm) further studied parks infrastructure based on the recommendations in the Mini-Master Plan
- Based on the pre-design study conducted by, the City of Duluth will refocus NPS grant funds to the following: (1) WPA Pavilion Restoration (2) Signage and wayfinding (3) Upper Terrace restoration, including new parking lot, ADA trail connections and resurfacing of multi-use sport field (4) Playground (5) site lighting at WPA Pavilion/Playground.
- The redesigned elements of the plan add value to the park and its future users including the creation of better sight lines throughout the park, a long-term resilient solution to a failing retaining wall and overall increased ADA accessibility along multiple entry points and trails throughout the southern segment of the park.



- Summer 2018 Phase I Cultural and Historical Review; State Historical Preservation Office (SHPO)/Tribal Historical Preservation Office (THPO)
- Summer 2018 Pre-Design to further investigate design options and budget estimation
- Summer 2018 Finalizing grant agreement paperwork with National Park Service
- Fall 2018 Upper Terrace Demolition; site preparation for 2019 construction
- Fall/Winter 2018 Final Design based on findings of studies, construction document preparation for 2019 bid/construction
