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Chester Park Shared Trail Use Stakeholder Meeting

07/08/2019

History of Process

City of Duluth Chester Park Mini-Master Plan (approved November 2014), and the Cross Country Ski Trail Master Plan (approved May 2015) call for a shared use trial period, allowing pedestrians to utilize the Cross Country ski trails at Chester Park. As the plan dictates, if pedestrians and skiers are unable to coexist, the plan calls for the City to bring a recommendation to Parks Commission on or before June 01, 2017 to either:

- Build a separate parallel pedestrian trail
- Limit Nordic skiing in all or major parts of Chester

Parks management extended the trial period to 2018, and again until 2019. During which time numerous stakeholder and public meetings were held, and a trail user survey was conducted. Based on stakeholder participation, public input, and the trail user survey, it is determined that pedestrians and skiers are unable to coexist, and therefore a recommendation, as called for within the Chester Park Mini-Master Plan, will be brought to Parks Commission.

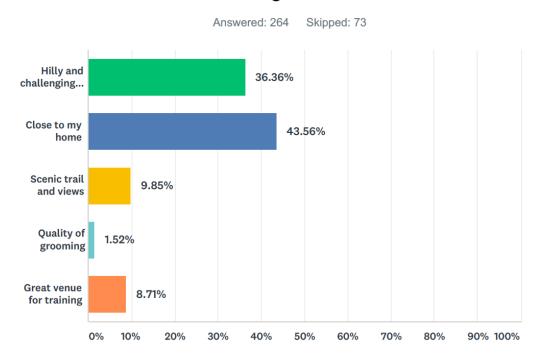

Next Steps

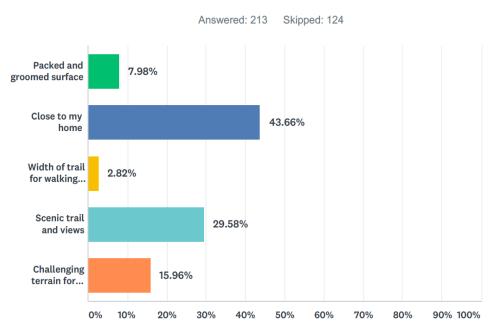
The Stakeholder group will conduct a site visit, reviewing problematic portions of trail, as well as areas of concern. Feedback from the Stakeholder group will determine which of the two options, set within the Chester Park Mini-Master Plan, should be presented; this determination will be incorporated into a recommendation which will be presented to Parks Commission at their August meeting, with action requested by the Commission at their September meeting.

Q4 If you use the trail for CROSS-COUNTRY SKIING, what do you like most about skiing at Chester Bowl?

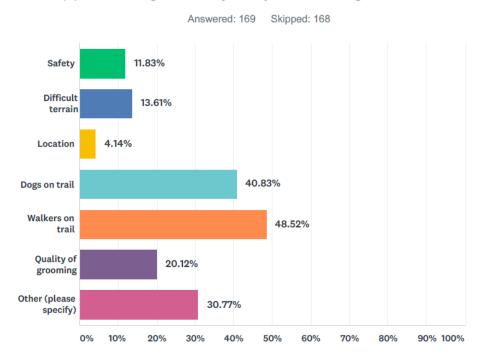


Q5 If you use the trail for WALKING OR RUNNING, what do you like most about walking/running at Chester Bowl?

Footprints on the groomed trail have diminished my experience

- · 93% of cross-country skiers strongly agree
- · 7% of walkers/runners strongly agree
- · 14% of cross-country skiers strongly disagree
- 86% of walkers/runners strongly disagree

Chester Bowl provides unique terrain unlike other areas in Duluth

- Of those that strongly agree with this:
 - 73% are skiers and 27% are walkers/runners

Chester Bowl is a great trail for training

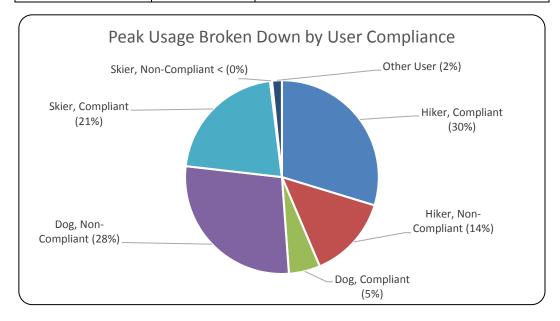
- · Of those that strongly agree with this:
 - 74% are skiers and 26% are walkers/runners

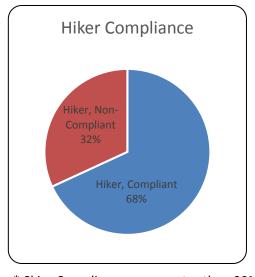
The packed groomed surface is an important reason I use the ski trail

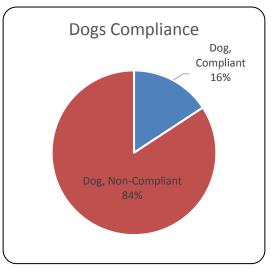
- Of those that strongly agree with this:

2018/2019 Trail & Counter Data

| Study Period | 12/27/18 to 04/01/19 | Base on skiable days of winter with 95% snow deck coverage and groomable depth of snow on trail surface |
|--------------------------------|-------------------------|--|
| Days of Skiable Snow | 91 Days | Start date based on first snowfall and first skier, and end date based on adequate snow coverage of ski deck to allow for a skiable surface with 95% snow coverage |
| Days of Groomed Ski Surface | 80 Days | Assumes the day after the groomed surface is no longer suitable for skiing |
| Daily Average Usage | 48 Users/Day | Mix of all users, includes dogs as an individual user |

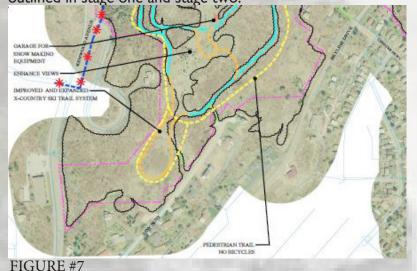
Trail Improvements - Duluth Traverse

The Duluth Traverse Trail (blue and red dashed trail with "red asterisks") borders the North and West edges of the Park and is part of a city wide off road multi-use connecting trail system. Adding this trail will direct adjacent neighbors to the appropriate trail as they enter the North and West sides of the Park.

Nordic Trail Improvements / Pedestrian Improvements - Shared Use Trail *

* Shared use means the trail can be used by both pedestrians and XC skiers; no bikes

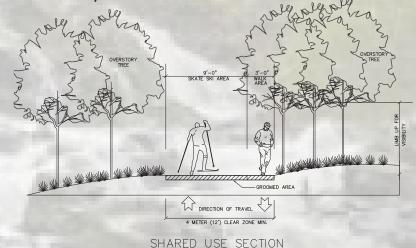
The City of Duluth has developed a Cross Country Ski Trail Master Plan which includes several suggested ski trail modifications. Comments received from both skiers and pedestrians initially identified the desire for a walking trail separate from the cross country ski trail. As the Plan developed, preference for a shared-use trail became more prevalent and resulted in the following preferred approach. While the proposed parallel pedestrian trail continues to be shown in the Plan, implementation of the Plan will occur as outlined in stage one and stage two:



STAGE ONE

On a trial basis, pedestrians and skiers will share a trail that is:

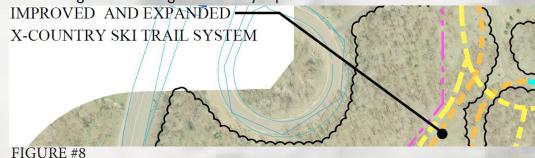
- Widened to its original width of approximately 4 meters (slightly more where safety concerns dictate) by brushing, shrub and rock removal and moderate earth work along some edges;
- Re-designated and re-signed for shared use;
- Groomed for skating (classic in beginner loop only);
- Routed so that pedestrians and skiers would proceed in opposite directions to increase their visibility to each other.

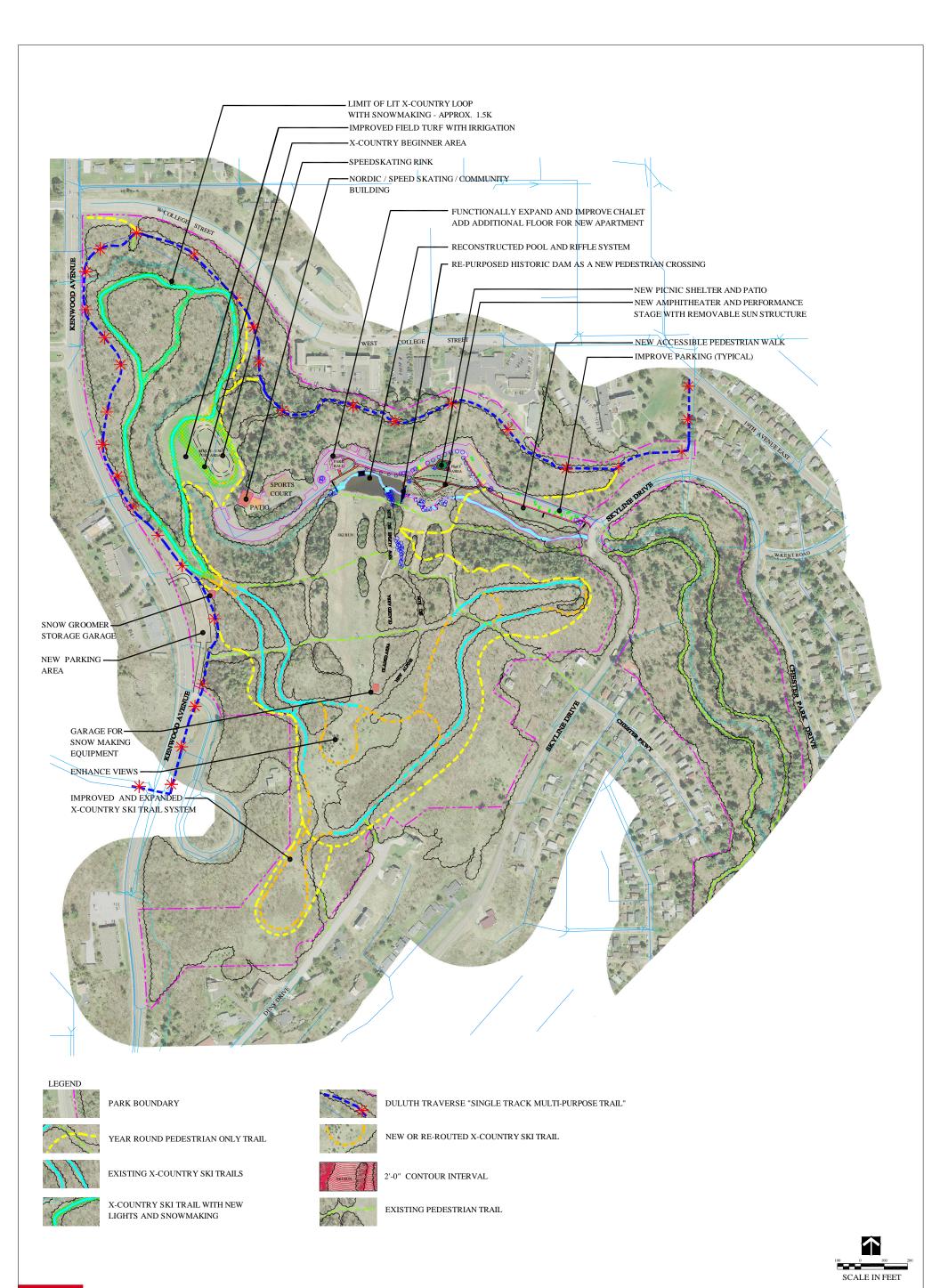


STAGE TWO

If pedestrians and skiers are unable to coexist in Stage One, the City will bring a recommendation to the Parks Commission on or before June 1, 2017 to determine proper action for Stage Two, Options include:

- Building a separate parallel pedestrian trail as in the current Plan;
- Limiting Nordic skiing in all or major parts of Chester.
